Concentrating on objects that have been used, I collect, document, and categorize my findings. As these collections and categories develop over time I look for repetition or trends within my archive. These trends function as a potential catalyst for further investigations of miscellanea."

### A HUMAN TRAGEDY......FA 2102A

Smith shares his photo project "A Human Tragedy" exploring the stories of 24 exonerees — the stories of 24 individuals who spent years in Texas prisons for crimes they didn't commit. Smith said, "I wanted people to know how rampant this is, that it's not just one unlucky guy you see on the news. There are nearly 80 people in the state of Texas that can call themselves exonerees. What we tried to do with this project is to kind of pick some real interesting stories to tell."
