## Bryan High School Captures First Rising Star St. Mark's Repeats as Top Program For Twelfth Year

Judging for the ATPI Top Program, ATPI Rising Star, Hal Fulgham and Sharon Jacobus Memorial Scholarships took place at St. Mark's School of Texas in Dallas on Saturday, April 28. Judges included Bob Malish, senior product specialist for Canon; Lane Baker, educator and Dallas commercial photographer; Tabitha Gray, a graduate photojournalism student; Andy Jacobsohn, photojournalist for the Dallas Morning News; Joseph Ibarra, a Dallas freelance photographer; and Amy Holmes George, executive director for the Texas Photographic Society.

"These students weren't 'taking photos,' they were 'making images,'" Jacobsohn said. George added, "The quality and diversity of work was simply impressive! I had to keep reminding myself that these students are in high school."

## Summer Workshop Stays in Fort Worth Area

Three Hands-On Opportunities Offered This Year

It's not too late to register for this year's ATPI Summer Workshop for Instructors Only, which will take place June 19-22 in Fort Worth.

Instructors can choose from three tracks:

- · Playing With Light: Led by Shannon Oden and Clint Smith (with additional instructors), this advanced hands-on class will focus on creating and managing light sources. Participants will learn about the use of offcamera class, light modifiers, studio lighting, tabletop product photography, lighting ratios and more. This class will involve location and studio shoots designed to allow participants to practice what they've learned. Supplies needed are: DSLR or mirrorless camera with manual controls, lenses used in your program, memory cards and tripod. Laptops and shoe mount flashes are optional.
- Photo Teaching Bootcamp: This class, taught by Jeff Grimm and John Knaur, will combine academic and practical exercises. Participants will explore assignment ideas, then practice what they've learned by completing the assignments. The class will not only give teachers assignment ideas to

implement, but examples to bring back to the classroom as well. Participants will need a DSLR or mirrorless camera, widetele zoom (kit lens OK), 50mm f/1.8 (if you have one), tripod, extra batteries and a charger. Laptops are optional.

• ReThinking Photography: John Isaac and Ian McVea will teach this advanced hands-on class. Participants will engage in hands-on shooting, critique sessions and post-processing of work. At the end of this class, participants will create a portfolio of work that includes a variety of photography genres. Bring a DSLR or mirrorless camera, extra lenses, a tripod, extra batteries and charger, and a hard drive or flash drive to

All classes will have the opportunity to participate in a night photo session Wednesday night in Fort Worth's Sundance Square.

Registration for the workshop is \$275. This includes two lunches, one dinner, and plenty of snacks (and candy!). Any teachers who have attended previous workshops can bring one new attendee and receive a \$25 discount on both registrations.

ATPI has booked a block of rooms at the Holiday Inn Express in downtown Fort Worth. Rooms are \$119/night and the block runs from June 18 through June 22. The rate does not include state sales tax (bring a tax exempt form if you're from a Texas school), the city tax (9 percent) or the Fort Worth Tourism PID (2 percent). Breakfast and free wireless internet are included in the nightly room cost and all workshop attendees will have free parking. Rooms must be booked by noon, May 21.

### **31st Winter Conference Held in Austin**

Nikon Sponsors Keynote Speaker James Balog

"Use your voices to speak the truth." Keynote speaker James Balog urged his audience at the 31st Annual ATPI Winter Conference to use the power of what he affectionately referred to as "that little glass eye" to document the world around them, to use their pictures and their words to reveal what they see.

Balog, a photographer, documentary filmmaker and founder of the Earth Vision Institute, opened the speech at the Texas Capitol in Austin by noting many in the audience held cameras and were taking his photo even as he was preparing to talk about his own work. The act of taking a photo can show our relationship to the world by documenting it, he said, in ways we do not always realize.

"That thing that you put up to your eyes — you think of it as a little device used for recording memories or things that are interesting or whatever, but over the decades I have come to realize that cameras do something much more special than that." Cameras are a way for humanity to sense the world, he added, allowing people to see it in a different way by holding onto moments. "There is something wonderful and special and noble about this act of reaching out and touching the world through the camera."

Balog spoke about his 2013 National Geographic documentary "Chasing Ice," about climate change in the Arctic, and about his newest

work, "The Human Element: A Photographer's Journey in the Anthropocene," which had been completed just the night before his speech. Both works deal with the Anthropocene — the current age in which humanity has shaped the planet and the environment; "Chasing Ice" documented melting glaciers and changing habitats for animals, while "The Human Element" follows people directly affected by climate change, from firefighters dealing with more frequent wildfires in the American West, to coastal residents watching their homes threatened by rising seas, to those impacted by flooding caused by Hurricane Irma. The film shows how the elements of air, fire, water and earth are impacted by a fifth element: people. It combines still photographs, live-action, timelapse, and interviews to document what is happening throughout the world.

Balog explained some of the technical details required for some of his projects, and talked also about the physical impacts on his own health. But he ended with an emphasis on why such efforts are necessary.

"We live in a time where there is, if you will forgive me for putting it in such ranch-like terms, a lot of bull--- in the world. And truth is important. And I find the potential for truth-telling with that little glass eye you are all carrying around

in your hands to be enormous and important." Photographers sometimes must interpret what they see, but that interpretation should always be grounded in truth, he said. "So it is a wonderful, wonderful thing that we're all doing with these cameras...potentially advancing the cause of truth in our civilization."

The awards and the keynote speech ended the first day of the conference, which featured competitions on the Capitol grounds and surrounding downtown Austin area in photography and editing, as well as sessions on a variety of topics. The conference moved to the campus of Austin Community College for Saturday's packed schedule of sessions on photography techniques, software, portfolio-building, and professional skills.
