WILLIAM SNYDER

Professor and undergraduate program director, advertising photography, Rochester Institute of Technology wdspph@rit.edu Snyder, a four-time Pulitzer Prize-winning photographer and editor, is professor and chair of the advertising photography program at his alma mater, the Rochester Institute of Technology (New York).

After graduating from RIT with highest honors in 1981, Snyder joined *The Miami News* and two years later moved to the photography staff of *The Dallas Morning News*. During his 15 years as a staff photographer, Snyder won three Pulitzer Prizes.

In 2005 he was named director of photography at the *Morning News* and guided staff members to the 2006 Pulitzer Prize in breaking news for their coverage of Hurricane Katrina. He also produced *Eyes of The Storm*, a 256-page book featuring the photo staff's images from hurricanes Katrina and Rita, which sold more than 14,000 copies.

In 2008, he returned to RIT as a photojournalism faculty member and a year later took over the program and lead the reworking of the faculty and curriculum that has made RIT one of the top photojournalism programs in the United States. In 2019, he became the director of the advertising photography program and remains a faculty member in the photojournalism program.

He has been the local host of The Kalish Workshop since 2015.






